Dear parents and guardians,

We are writing to alert you to a worrying increase in cases of measles in the UK, with large outbreaks detected in the West Midlands and London. Measles is a highly contagious viral disease that commonly causes fever and a rash.

In a small number of cases, measles infection can cause serious medical problems including pneumonia, meningitis, and seizures (fits). These complications are more common in young babies, pregnant women, and people with a weakened immune system.

Because measles is so contagious, it is likely we will see cases in Oxfordshire. Fortunately, we have a safe and effective vaccine which is included in the routine course of childhood vaccinations which are offered before children start school. Getting both doses of the measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine provides 99% protection against measles, so most children in Oxfordshire are very unlikely to catch or spread measles.

If for any reason your child or grandchild missed out on either dose of the MMR vaccine, it is not too late for them to have it. Catch-up vaccination is available at your GP practice. This is especially important for children over one year old who haven't yet had their first dose of MMR. The two doses are usually given:

- 1. At around one year, and
- 2. At around three to three-and-a-half years

Getting your child/grandchild vaccinated is the best way to protect them and others from the risks of measles infection, so please contact your GP to arrange for catch-up vaccination if they have not previously had the MMR vaccine. Unvaccinated children who are identified as close contacts of confirmed measles cases may have stay at home for up to three weeks to avoid the possibility of them passing the infection on to other members of the school community.

If you are worried that your child might have measles you can find useful information on the Department of Education website: <u>'What to do if you think your child has measles and when</u> to keep them off school'.

Tackling road danger in Headington

Many of us who live in Headington know from personal experience how unsafe our local roads can be as a result of illegal or antisocial driving. People often comment that dangerous driving seems to have become more common recently, particularly post-lockdown.

These views are backed up by the results of <u>Thames Valley Police's recent public survey</u>, which shows that speeding or reckless/dangerous driving is the crime most experienced and is perceived as the biggest issue. In Oxfordshire, the number of people killed or seriously injured in 2022 rose above pre-pandemic years.

However, we've been advised that available data doesn't show that Headington suffers from poor road safety, making it difficult to get the Police or County Council to take action to address road danger here. This lack of data is likely due to a low level of reporting of incidents.

A group of parents concerned about children's safety in Headington Quarry is working with a local police officer on making a persuasive public safety case for implementing effective road safety measures in Headington. To do this we need evidence of both illegal and antisocial driving incidents.

We are therefore encouraging people to report incidents of **dangerous**, **careless or other illegal driving** in Headington to the **Police** whenever they have photographic or video evidence. Illegal driving includes:

- driving on the pavement
- running a red light
- speeding
- not stopping at a pedestrian crossing

Incidents should be reported using <u>this Thames Valley Police road traffic incident reporting form</u>. In the text, please **mark the report for the attention of the North East Oxford Neighbourhood Team**, and attach any video or photographic evidence you have of the incident.

If you experience non-illegal driving incidents that may not be reportable to the Police but nevertheless contribute to making the roads unsafe, please consider sending the details and any video or photo evidence of the incident to the parents' road safety group at <u>quarryroadsafety@gmail.com</u> so that they can compile evidence to present to the Police. Examples of this type of incident include:

- rapid acceleration, putting other road users at risk
- high traffic volumes or speeds that make it difficult and dangerous to cross roads
- rounding corners too fast
- HGVs driving on inappropriate roads
- big traffic queues that make it difficult for people walking, wheeling or cycling to navigate the roads safely

By reporting illegal driving incidents to the Police and forwarding details of dangerous but not illegal incidents to the parents' safety group, we can help build a public safety case for action in Headington. Kind regards
